Program

One organization benefitting from our donations this year was the **Cy-creek Greenway Project**. This project is managed by a committee within the Cypress Creek Flood Control Coalition. **Mr. Robertson**, a long-time resident of Lakewood Forest, is the committee chair and came to visit with us today.

As he explained, the plan of his committee is to connect more than a dozen parks along the 52-mile Cypress Creek watershed. He is working to gain support for the project from area legislators and community leaders, the county, homeowner's associations, MUD boards and developers. He brought poster boards to explain the layout of the proposed improvements to the areas along the Cypress Creek and its contributories.

Cypress Creek flows from Waller county through



Harris county and empties into the Gulf of Mexico in Galveston county. Mr. Robertson negotiates with many agencies to help preserve the natural areas that have strong recreational value and an important historic past.



Area history showed that native Americans once lived along the creek's habitat. Sam Houston and his troops camped next to the creek along what is now the Hewlett-Packard campus near State Hwy 249 and Louetta Road.

Mr. Robertson passionately advocates to preserve the woodlands along and around the creek and protect the land from being developed for commercial and residential use. He credits retiring State Sen. Jon Lindsay (R-7) as being instrumental in the

purchase of several tracts of land that the Greenway Project hopes to encompass in the current projects.

"There are a lot of good things moving in the right direction here," Mr. Robertson said. "I think this will have an impact on our quality of life, our home values, desirability of our area ... it will be good for our community."



The meeting continued with **Jean Robinson** updating us about correspondents she received for the club and letters with checks she sent out to recipients of the club's donations.

Jean also reminded us that the Lilli of the valley is the May flower of the month.



Terri Cole reported proudly on a volunteer day at the Brookwood Community. Several ladies of the Garden Club skillfully assisted with their 'Lunch and Learn' Program. Dressed in black pants and white blouses, and donning their LF aprons, they made a incredible impression at the Brookwood Café.
