### Program



Our scheduled presenter had to cancel in the last moment. But **Pam** Randall stepped up to the plate with a presentation she had prepared for the Federation meeting last month. The topic of her 'Show and Tell' talk was:

# "Technology in the Garden – it is not your grandmother's garden anymore".

She introduced to us Mr. Chain cutter, a battery powered, miniature chain saw that effortless cuts up to 3-inch-thick branches.

One of her own favorite garden appliances is a

kitchen composter by Vitamix. It will turn kitchen scraps into fine humus-like compost in a few hours.

A line of 'Supervisors', are probes to stick in the ground. They will measure instantly level of moisture, pH, light, etc. Some communicate with your smart phone and alert you to the needs of your plants and soil. SonCare is one of many 4- in-1 soil testers.



A Macro-lens attached to the cell phone can zoom in on plants and insects for better identification. When used with an appropriate App, follow-up information on the identified plant or pest problem is offered along with the best way to fix the disease or eliminate the pest.



Other Apps, connected to your sprinkler system, monitor conditions from your back yard or official weather station to automatically turn on/off the watering of the lawn. There is even an App that follows the cycle of the moon the tell you the optimal time to harvest your crops.

But if conditions are too wet, hot or cold for you outside, gardening can also be done in the comfort of your home. Self-contained units will allow you to grow

plants in a self-regulated, perfect environment. These units come in various sizes. They can be vertical, hang from the ceiling, or can be built into kitchen cabinets.

A solar powered, self-propelled robot, the TERTIL, will till and weed your flower beds.

For taller weeds and brush, the BUSH HOG will do the job its weaker cousin, the TERTL, can't accomplish.





Also solar powered and self-propelled, the BUSH HOG does not need your assistance in the yard. You can stay on the couch with your favorite adult beverage and watch the robot do the job you used to have to do.

Self-propelled lawn mowers have been on the market for some time. They are popular in Europe and ideal for smaller lawns.

Pam presented her program with much humor. She showed us short videos on how these various devices work and gave us information on make and model of the gadgets she featured. Many of us were interested in the composter but at around \$300.00, it is a costly appliance.

The ultimate in 'high tech' garden robot, is the FARMBOT. It will ensure that you can grow your vegetables and herbs without ever stepping foot in the garden. Once set up this 'self-directed planter will prepare the soil, plant the seeds, add fertilizer and water as needed and constantly monitor growing condition.



### Transportation

**Donna** has arranged a bus trip for us. On March 11 we will tour the **KLEB WOODS** Nature Preserve. Located in Tomball, this property was a family farm once owned by the early German immigrant Conrad Kleb. Mr. Kleb came to this part of Harris County in the 1840s. His latest descendant, Elmer, inherited the farm. He stopped farming and let the place go back to nature where he enjoyed the company of birds and small animals. Elmer Kleb


