





History of Star of Hope Mission

Ending homelessness... one life, one family at a time.

Most of us were not alive at the turn of the 20th Century,

but it was a time of great beginnings. It was the time when Reverend Dennis R. Pevoto, a Baptist minister, having set sail for New York from Savannah, Georgia, had a dream that altered the course of his life and the lives of hundreds of thousands of people from that point to this very day. He experienced a Divine vision in which he was being called to come to Houston to establish a refuge for Houston's lost community of men—men who had fallen on hard times and never recovered, men who were alcoholic, helpless and hopeless with no place to go. It was to be named Star of Hope Mission.

By 1906 Reverend Pevoto had arrived in Houston and was making headway toward his vision. He met with other Baptist clergy and Evangelist Mordecai Ham. Together, they formed the first shelter for homeless men in the city, and Star of Hope Mission began its life-changing work on July 1, 1907, in a two-story building at 714 Franklin Street, with a former alcoholic named Richard Dowling appointed as the first director. Eventually Star of Hope was relocated to Congress Street and then to LaBranch Street, where it ministered to homeless men for 45 years, from 1955 to 2000.

It was during the period at the LaBranch location that homelessness took a turn. It was no longer reflective of the peculiar poverty of urban men. Suddenly, it began to take on a softer look, all too frequently, innocent and desperate, as women and children became the fastest growing population among the homeless. In fact, nationally, the average age of the homeless person is nine years old.

The latter part of the 20th century saw greater and greater numbers of frightened women and children entering the homeless scene. In response, Star of Hope opened the Women and Family Emergency Shelter in 1986 on North Main Street. The goal was to provide the love of Christ through a nurturing, safe environment that comforted and encouraged the most vulnerable among the homeless. Two years later, the Transitional Living Center opened on Calhoun Street, offering a year-long residential program for homeless women and families, to ensure that they could re-enter mainstream society fully equipped to be self-sufficient.

The Women and Family Emergency Shelter, in its second home at 419 Dowling Street, underwent a million dollar renovation to maximize the safety, comfort and care of its residents. In the spring of 2004, the June Waggoner House of Hope Day Care Center was opened on that site providing the very best in childcare and after school programs for more than 100 homeless youngsters and teens.

The Transitional Living Center, also in its second home at 6801 Ardmore was a custom-built complex. On the property was the Hope Center Administration Building serving the entire Star of Hope ministry. In addition, there were 111 single and family apartments, including service and program centers that target healthcare, childcare, education, employment, substance abuse recovery and life-skills management.

Located at 1811 Ruiz Street, is the home of the Doris and Carloss Morris Men's Development Center, completed for occupancy in June of 2000. It was formerly the Men's Emergency Shelter. In this 70,000 square foot, state-of-the-art facility, God is at work renewing the hearts and minds of broken men, casting off the old and bringing forth new opportunities for physical, emotional, occupational and spiritual wholeness through programs and services similar to those at the Transitional Living Center.

Today, Star of Hope Mission is in its own stage of great beginnings. The Star of Hope's Cornerstone Community transformational campus, located on Reed Road at the intersection of Highway 288, now consolidates our clients and staff from our downtown Women and Family Emergency Shelter and the Transitional Living Center near the Texas Medical Center, at the Women and Family Development Center. The new site houses up to 160 homeless, single women and 130 homeless families where they will progress towards independent living through our basic recovery services and our longer-term programs. In addition, mental, physical and spiritual health services are offered with on-site permanent supportive housing and convenient public transportation, all in a walkable campus environment.

Thank you for supporting Star of Hope in its efforts to uplift our suffering neighbors, providing them with help and HOPE and freedom from the grip of despair.

HORTICULTURE CORNER

How Do You Force Amaryllis Bulbs For Christmas?

Option 1

- Six weeks before Christmas (approximately November 13)—Purchase Amaryllis bulbs that are "designed for forcing". The label will state this.
- Fill the bulb forcing vase to the neck with water
- Trim any brown, dry roots off the bulb.
- Place the bulb in a vase so that the root area is submerged. To prevent rot, ensure that the bulb itself is not in contact with the water.
- Position in a warm, sunny location—usually around 60-70°F.
- It will take around six weeks for the amaryllis to bloom.



- Another truly effortless way to force bulbs for Christmas is to grow WAXED BULBS. All they need is sunlight.
- Waxed bulbs are as their name suggests—the bulb has been dropped into wax. The wax contains the moisture and heat to grow.
- Simply purchase your waxed bulb and a stand and place them in a sunny windowsill. The bulb will grow and flower between three to six weeks.

Lakewood Forest Garden Club's 50th Anniversary Celebration

On the first Friday of March 2024 the Lakewood Forest (LF) garden club celebrated the 50th



anniversary of the club. A planning committee under the direction of Harolene Hatley worked for months to make this a special event. Committee members shared their talents and resources to organize a sophisticated 'HIGH TEA' for the membership. Ladies dressed in unusually elegant attire arrived at an equally elegant setting to reflect on the half century of the club's existence, enjoyed the reminiscence, the camaraderie and the good food. Previous presidents were part of the gathering and shared stories about the early function and development of the club.

In the early 1970's the Lakewood Forest subdivision was a new development in Harris county. Families came from all over the country to settle their families in this new housing sector just north of Houston. Neighbors met and friendships formed over time. A group of ladies came together frequently over a glass of wine and discussed, among other things, their often-frustrating experiences of keeping their yard growing, flowers blooming and pests away from plants in this subtropical climate. Their shared interest around gardening attracted more neighbors and led to establishing a garden



club. In 1974 the Lakewood Forest Garden Club was created with Ginger Cunliffe (picture right), the energetic originator of the group, as its first president.



With a steady increase in membership, the mission of the club grew beyond caring for their own yards and extended to the beautification of the subdivision. In coordination with the HOA, the team planted flowers in the medians and decorated the wing walls at each entrance to the growing subdivision. Outside their own community, club members focused on community engagement which led to the creation and

maintenance of a Butterfly Garden at the local elementary school, volunteer activities at Mercer Arboretum and the Brookwood Community, and various wildlife organizations. For the annual fundraising event the club purchased flats of flowers from a local garden center and sold them to their neighbors from the parking lots of the club house. Proceeds from the fundraiser were distributed to many other nature and environmental focused organizations within the local community.

These gals were busy but they also took time for fun activities. During monthly meetings they learned the art of flower arranging and wreath making as well as many other plants and flower centered arts and craft projects.

A few years after its founding, a few club members organized a short vacation trip outside of Houston where they had a great time just relaxing and getting to know each other. These 3-day trips became an annual tradition known as the Spring Fling. In recent years the club has visited gardens, parks and

historical sites in places like Waco, Nacogdoches, Austin and Tyler, just to name a few. It is one of the most favorite events of the club and attracts an ever-growing number of participants.

Besides the Spring Fling members take day trips to garden and nature related places or historical sites around Houston such as 'Nature's Way' in Conroe, the Antique Rose Emporium in Brenham and the

Hummingbird Observatory and weigh station in Lake Jackson and the Bryan Museum in Galveston.

Although membership in the LF garden club has remained relatively steady over the years, its future was threatened by the Covid shut downs in 2020. Newly elected president, Eleese Lester-Baier (picture right), saved the club as she quickly pivoted the monthly meetings to a ZOOM format. Her enthusiasm and sense of humor kept members engaged as she led fun filled electronic conferences that even computer challenged members could follow and enjoy.






Over the years the membership changed as new people joined and others moved away or lost interest. Today, the club registers over 70 members. Our well-established club has a large number of ladies that belonged to the group for decades. They are the keepers of the club's history and are a valuable resource for us all. Gloria Cox (picture left) is our most senior member. She joined the club a year after its conception. Gloria recently recruited her daughter-in law into the LF garden club ensuring the continued growth and rejuvenation of the club. Eleese Lester Baier and Joyce Lester, Pat Gauger and Huguette were another mother and daughter garden club team. Membership grew mostly through family,

friends and neighbor connections. Besides mothers and daughters, we also have sisters and cousins as members. At each meeting we welcome guests, many of which become members. The strength of the club and its resilience lies in the friendly and giving spirit of its members. We look out for each other and are there to support each other, not only when it comes to gardening but also in the health and wellbeing of the members and our community.






